Summer in Year 1



In Maths we have been thinking about coins. We have been learning what different coins look like and how we can count them. We loved pretending to be shopkeepers and customers to buy items!




























Year 2


Art

We have continued our exploration of 'Scratch' this half term. We have used the coding blocks to make our Sprite draw shapes and have also had a go at coding it to write our name!


Geography

We have been learning about Europe. Our lessons have led us to explore Athens, looking at the human and physical features. We have discussed why people would want to visit, through a silent debate.









Opening Minds Week

Year 3 loved all of the activities they took part in during Opening Minds Week. We pushed ourselves and worked on our perseverance during our Malvern Hills walk, showing great enthusiasm. We also took a walk around the village to look at the human and physical features. We looked at the different road signs, open spaces and of course the park (that obviously had to be tested). Back at school, we explored the question 'What habitats are around our school?'. The children recorded evidence of plant and animal life, before writing postcards to explain why these spaces need looking after.

Ukelele

We have been making great progress with our ukelele lessons and can now use the C, F, Am and G7 chords to play along to songs.

Year 4 Class News

The Year 4 children have continued to work hard and produce some impressive work, in all areas of the curriculum. Friendships have blossomed and all children have risen to the challenge of working and playing with children they would not normally choose to. It has led to new friendships and a lovely atmosphere in the classroom. Year 4 are very sensible and mature whenever we have class discussions about ways in which we are changing both physically and emotionally. They are very supportive of each other and are able to give advice and share their own stories about how they have changed since starting school and how they coped with those









In Science, Y4 have been learning about the dangers of the sun and have made posters to remind people how to stay safe.















There is nothing more exciting than a set of science lessons that involve eating and messy play! This is exactly what a topic involving states of matter provides. After testing the properties of ice pops before and after freezing, observing the changes in jelly cubes as they melt and set, and finally experiencing the thrill of cornflour mixed with water, the children can now tell you lots about changes in states of matter.













It is always a delight to mark the books in Year 4 and the examples above showcase why, perfectly. As part of their RE topic, the children were asked to think about the meaning of the words in the Lord's Prayer and then illustrate a handwritten copy to reflect their ideas. All the children thought very carefully about the meaning of each line and discussed their relevance to Christians and non-Christians alike.









The whole class have astounded me with their enthusiasm, focus and sheer determination to pass the Multiplication Check. Every child in class has made outstanding progress, and over half the class are able to answer over 60 multiplication question in under 1 minute, making them 'Rock Heroes'. There are also a handful of pupils in year 4 who can answer over 130 questions in 1 minute giving them a speed of under 0.5 seconds—it is truly awe inspiring to watch!









It's not all hard work in Year 4; the children have plenty of time to chill out and enjoy building friendships as well as keeping active with their friends. The adventure trail is a particularly popular spot for the class.





Cinderella Cookies



Cookies

- 1. 2 grams of plain flour
- 2. 1/4 Tsp. salt
- 3. 3/4 grams softened unsalted butter
- 4. 1 large egg
- 5. 1 Tsp vanilla extract

Topping

- 1. 1/4 grams sugar
- 2. blue food colouring
- 3. white pearl chocolate

For Cookies:

- 1. Combine all the dry ingredients together in a large bowl and mix.
- 2. Next, add the wet ingredients (butter, egg, vanilla extract).
- 3. Mix until everything is combined. Do not over mix.
- 4. You can roll out the dough and flatten them and press the cookie cutter in the dough and then peel the access dough off and use it for the next cookie.

For the Topping:

- 1. Add the 1/4 sugar and 10 small drops of blue food colouring in a mixer and mix until fully combined. Once all the cookie circles are cut out, drizzle the tops of the cookies with the blue sugar topping.
- 2. Preheat oven at 325 degrees. Bake for 15 minutes. Once the cookies come out of the oven quickly add the White pearl chocolate to the tops.
- 3. Allow to cool, enjoy!







